
Will has a six-year Navy enlistment to complete, and hasn't yet formed plans beyond that. He is a young man who thinks seriously about the matters and values related to his life. He

Operation Reachout is a combined ministry of World Ministries to the Armed Forces (WMAF), Northland Baptist Bible College (NBBC), and Tabernacle Baptist Church of Lebanon, MO. From the Pulpit: Message and Bible Study

Title: LABORING OVER CONFESSED SIN?

Scripture: Romans 4:7-8

A young lady came to my office for counsel. She sat down with a grief-disfigured face and wringing her hands. "What is wrong?" I asked. She related various things that she had done and events that impacted her life. "Did you ask for God's forgiveness?" I inquired. "Yes," she said, "I have asked Him many times!" "Do you think He has forgiven you?" To this she replied, "I don't know. It is very hard for me to believe in a God I cannot see." This comes from a person who has been a believer for some time.

We live in a complex world. Since the arrival of the computer and the information highway, we walk into the vast world of knowledge and realize our insignificance. It seems that nothing is easy, or clear, or simple. Books are written and seminars are held to help us organize our time and simplify our lives. We are even working to make our work easier!

Having been a pastor for over thirty years, I see a growing disbelief in the personal work of God because of all this complexity. A growing number of people that request my counsel, labor over their forgiven sin. That's right, *forgiven sin*. It seems, at least for some, that it is very difficult to believe that God has forgiven them and put their sin away. They wonder how He can do that. "It can't be over. It can't be that simple," they say. However, it *is* forgiven. It *is* finished.


There is a slight difference between unbelief and disbelief. Though a subtle difference, unbelief is the lack of belief. This may, or may not, be intentional. It is the more general term that suggests the lack of belief, for whatever reason. Disbelief is the act of disbelieving. It is the denial of belief, or better put, the refusal to believe. Because we cannot comprehend God's great ocean of forgiveness, we refuse to believe it. I am reminded of a quote once given to me, "Our belief or disbelief of a thing does not alter the nature of the thing," Tillotson.

There is no demonstration of the power of God like the simple forgiveness of sin. God is able to forgive us when we cannot forgive ourselves. The problem with the young lady was not God's forgiveness, but hers! She would not

believe that God could really do this; and that at some point further on in her life would face her with the same sins again. If she can't forget them, how could God forget them? To this God replies in *Psa 103:12 As far as the east is from the west, so far hath he removed our transgressions from us.* He *forgives* the sincere heart and *forgets* their sin.

Not only does He forgive us, but He also removes the sin and all accompanying punishment with it. Further still, He blesses the penitent who puts their trust in Him. Rom 4:7 ...Blessed are they whose iniquities are forgiven, and whose sins are covered. (8) Blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not impute sin. Once God has put our sins away from us, He will never bring those sins up to us again. It is forgiven. That's what forgiveness means. It is as simple as that!

How sad that so many are defeated by their *forgiven* sins. How tragic that today's victory is robbed from us by our own unbelief. So much time is wasted in the futile worry over confessed sin. Tomorrow's guaranteed blessings will not materialize because of our lack of trust in Him for our past indiscretions. God's forgiveness comes from His fathomless love for us. If we sincerely confess our sins to Him, He forgives us and never holds them against us again! It is that simple!

STANDING IN THE GAP

Nothing strikes more terror in the heart of naval personnel than a fire on board ship while at sea. There is little place to run or hide, one must stand and fight for the life of the ship and its personnel. Smoke coursing through air ducts can readily kill even at the other end of the ship, if that smoke enters the wrong ductwork, which supplies ventilation to that area of the ship.

Great heroism on the part of the crew of the U.S.S. Forrestal was shown on the eventful day of July 29, 1967. While preparing for a mission over North Vietnam, a rocket from one plane somehow managed to fire. It streaked across the deck striking another plane igniting its avgas. An enormous fire occurred that set off a bomb aboard another plane. The blast killed most of the firefighters and sent burning fuel downward through the torn deck into the decks below. Fire fighting crewmen quickly stood in the gap to save the ship, while planes burned and their missiles exploded. When it was all over, 134 men were dead and 161 injured. Twentyone planes were destroyed and the carrier extensively damaged. It was the worst single day's casualties in the Navy since WWII. While flight deck cameras taped the entire incident, the brave men of the Forrestal fought the fires and saved their ship.
